



Trails

There are five trails and the auto tour road available for walking, jogging, snowshoeing, and cross country skiing while observing wildlife and views of the Refuge. Visitors should remain on designated trails, county roads, and the Auto Tour Road. Pets must be kept on a short leash at all times throughout the year. Bicycles are not allowed on any of the foot trails. All trails are open year round, except Island Pond Trail is closed periodically in the fall months during the waterfowl hunting season for public safety.

Auto Tour Route

This 4.5 mile long gravel road offers views of the Refuge's wetland and grassland habitats and Myrtle Creek. The one-way road has 3 pull-outs, and begins at the refuge office and exits on the county road near the mouth of Deep Creek. The Auto Tour Road is open to licensed vehicles, bicycles, and walkers/hikers during daylight hours, year round, weather and road conditions permitting. The road is not plowed in the winter and is open to cross-country skiing and snowshoeing.
